

than expected. Some vintners fared much better than others and have reason to be enthusiastic about the outcome of the vintage, even if the journey was perilous.

No wine or region in 2011 escaped the unusually cool, often damp weather that hung over the growing season and impacted ripeness. Late-season rains did the most damage, particularly along the North Coast. Most vintners had already adjusted to the cold spring and reduced their crop load, banking on enough heat to fully ripen their fruit.

The year's Rhône reds share many stylistic traits with other Golden State wines from the vintage. They are less ripe than usual, showing unwieldy tannins and often coming up short at midpalate. Quality is all over the map, with some wines delivering pure, rich flavors and others displaying botrytis and occasionally mold.

"[It] was a roller coaster of a vintage that was slow to start and seemed to drag on forever," says winemaker Chris Pittenger of Skinner Vineyards, voicing a sentiment shared by many. "A cold and wet spring diminished yields, and meticulous farming was essential to bringing in quality fruit, especially after the October rains."

Jeff Ames, winemaker at Tor, says that the defining aspect of the vintage is "the almost complete lack" of heat at times during the growing season when heat would be expected. Though there was some good early-season heat that pushed the state's Rhône grapes to get started, overall the summer of 2011 was the coolest in recent memory. Yet Rhône varieties fared better than red grapes such as Cabernet Sauvignon, which relies more heavily on the normal September heat for ripening. The cooler weather, Ames explains, allowed the Rhône grapes to hang longer into the late summer and fall, since there wasn't the concern that they would get overripe.

Since our previous report ("California Rhônes' Savory Allure," March 31, 2013), we have reviewed 550 Rhône Valley-inspired


reds in our Napa Valley office, along with nearly 100 Rhône whites, the latter tasted since our Aug. 31 report on the state's white wines ("California's Fresh Whites"). This report focuses on the 2011 vintage, though you'll still find plenty of wines from 2010, the better of the two years. (A free alphabetical list of scores and prices for all wines tasted is available at www.winespectator.com/033114.)

Syrah continues to be the dominant grape pulling the Rhône wagon. Yet cuvées employing two or more grapes are more common than varietal bottlings, and just about anything goes when mixing and matching different varieties.

Mourvèdre and Grenache are gaining in popularity and admiration, while non-Rhône grapes MONTER BAY Such as Cabernet, Merlot and Zinfandel, among others, are finding their way into blends.

"If you want prototypical superdense, dark California Rhône-based wines, then the 2010s and '12s are probably more up your alley," says Ames. "If you are looking for something with a bit more acid, finesse and restraint, then the 2011s are wines you should be looking at."

For Turley winemaker Tegan Passalacqua, vintners dodged a bullet in 2011. "The real saving grace of the 2011

vintage was the low yields," he says. "We were about 20 percent below normal. Had 2011 crop levels been similar to 2012 and 2013 it would have been a complete disaster. Most of our sites really benefited from this low-crop-level, cool-year combo. Our warmer sites expressed perfume that I have rarely experienced, and our coolest site, bramble and pepper."

In many ways, California Rhônes are at the cutting edge not only of grapegrowing and winemaking, but also of how Golden State producers market their wines. These blends of sometimes unfamiliar grapes are not the straightforward, varietally uniform bottlings that many American winedrinkers are accustomed to and comfortable with. Instead, learning these wines' composition often means looking at the back label and making sense of diverse grapes and blending combinations. Some wines don't divulge even that much. In this sense, Rhône-style wines have more in common with their European brethren, where blends are common.

Yet there are some historical markers. Petite Sirah, a traditional workhorse grape genetically related to Syrah, remains true to itself and its long history in California. Even in a difficult

year such as 2011, Petite merits special attention, both as a standalone varietal and in blends.

The confluence of all these elements, as well as plenty of new labels, makes the fast-paced Rhône scene the most dynamic in California. There's wide-ranging diversity on display among the top 2011s alone. The report's highest-scoring Petite is the Turley Paso Robles Pesenti Vineyard (95 points on the *Wine Spectator* 100-point scale, \$35); Keplinger's Caldera El Dorado (94, \$60) is the top Mourvèdre blend; Keplinger's Lithic Amador County (94, \$60) and Saxum's James Berry Vineyard Paso Robles (93, \$89) showcase Grenache; and the Herman Story Santa Barbara County White Hawk Vineyard (94, \$48) is the top Syrah. Only Pinot Noir rivals the range of appellations; no other category rivals the blends.

There were successes in 2011 in each of the major regions that produce Rhône-style reds. Here's a look at the leading appellations and the wines that fared best. (See the chart on page 76 for the top wines and top values overall, along with our top Rhône whites.)

NAPA VALLEY / Rhône grapes don't play much of a role in Cabernet country, but what is produced is often among the best the state has to offer, with three 2010s at 95 points: the Araujo Syrah Eisele Vineyard (\$135), Colgin Syrah IX Estate (\$200) and Shafer Relentless (\$72), a blend of Syrah and Petite Sirah.

The top-rated 2011s include the Girard Petite Sirah (93, \$30), Lagier Meredith Syrah Mount Veeder (92, \$48) and Lewis Alec's Blend (92, \$60), which mixes Syrah with Merlot and Cabernet. Turley also made two 2011 Petites at 93 points: the Howell Mountain Rattlesnake Ridge (\$44) and Napa Valley Library Vineyard (\$38).

PASO ROBLES / Midway between San Francisco and Los Angeles, this appellation is hanging its hat on Rhône reds. The 2011 vintage was cool but not wet, says Jordan Fiorentini of Epoch. A hard April frost cut the crop significantly and delayed the growing season.

"It made me quite happy knowing that Paso has gears and can also play the cooler-climate act," says Fiorentini. "We got grapes that were completely ripe—from 25.5 to 28 Brix—and I did not ever feel pressured to pick because an impending storm was coming. The numbers were textbook perfect. The fruit condition was perfect."

Epoch's wines are more subtle than flamboyant, and Fiorentini expects they'll take longer to come around and age well. The winery's Sensibility 2011 (92, \$65) and Veracity 2011 (91, \$65), both Grenache-based blends from Paderewski Vineyard, show the outstanding quality this region is capable of even in a difficult year.

SANTA BARBARA / The southernmost parts of the state avoided the heavy rains in 2011, but not the cooler temperatures. "The


picks were late and we had a whole line of storm systems in the Pacific threatening to give us a cool, wet harvest," says Craig Jaffurs of Jaffurs Wine Cellars. "Miraculously, that did not happen."

As has become expected in Santa Barbara, Syrah is the star, with the grape dominating this report's list of top-scoring reds. Grenache is close behind, whether in varietal bottlings or blends.

"We dropped fruit early and opened our canopies," explains Jaffurs. "We had a relatively dry winter preceding harvest, so the clusters were small. They reached full maturity at relatively low sugar levels—23.5 to 25 Brix. Grenache and Mourvèdre came in nicely dark and tannic, with great structure."

Jaffurs is bullish on his 2010 wines, yet considers the 2011s more complete. "They are gently fruit-forward, but have big tannins and ample acid," he says. "Some folks have called these wines chewy. They remind me of the 2009s, but with less ripeness."
